# Greetings from Anita



"A furious squall came up, and the waves broke over the boat, so that it was nearly swamped. Jesus was in the stern sleeping on a cushion." Mark 4: 37-38





The clean-up is taking place after Storm Ashley brought high winds and flood alerts to the Western Isles and northern Scotland last Sunday. The trees have had their first hoovering for this Autumn and the garden is a sea of brown, gold and crimson. The discarded leaves replenishing rapidly despite our best attempts to herd them into our brown bin. Gazing out on the swirls and peaks of discarded leaves with an occasional oasis of green grass, I am amazed and delighted at the patterns left by the wind. Feeling somehow that there might be a message in them, if I but knew how to interpret it.

The account of Jesus calming the storm is recorded in three of the four gospels, Matthew, Mark and Luke. Yet, only in Mark do we have the detail of the cushion. On this cushion Jesus slept soundly despite the storm raging and the waves crashing over the boat. I could do with one of those cushions!

It is inevitable in this life that we all experience storms at some time or other; our health, relationships, employment issues or the economy to name but a few of the squalls that sometimes appear out of nowhere. Then we go below and see if we can wake Jesus, we pray! Perhaps, like the disciples we panic. Our faith is tested, and we are found wanting, 'Why are you afraid? Do you still have so little faith?'

Critics of Christianity would have us believe faith is a crutch, implying Christianity is for weak and emotionally needy people. I prefer to think of faith as a cushion, very similar to the one on which Jesus slept on so soundly. A sound faith enables us to tell the rising storm within or without, 'Quiet! Be still'. No doubt there will be more storms to come as we travel through autumn to winter, with the presidential election in America and continued conflict in the Middle East and Ukraine. Remember, Jesus said, *'In this world you will have trouble. But take heart! I have overcome the world.'* 

Thank you Lord, for the cushion that all our hopes and dreams and fears sleep on.

# Reflections of Activities of the St Andrew's Parish Church Boys' Brigade and Former Members' Association

Sunday Morning Bible Class 10.00am "The Most Important Part of BB Work". The Motto of St Andrew's Parish Boys' Brigade was "Quit Ye Like Men, Be Strong". The BB Promoted The Habits Of Obedience, Reverence, Discipline, and Self-Respect.

When I first stepped into the Church Hall - which was at the back of the Church - for the first time in 1950, there was a comfortable feeling of belonging to a friendly group of boys of my own age and older, together with officers of the BB who immediately welcomed you into what was to become an adventure into the unknown. For some reason, I was surprised at the high number inside the hall at that time on a Sunday morning, but that was to become the norm for the years ahead. At this point, I must give my apologies for any - or many - lapses in memory as these recollections stretch back some 74 years. Our BB Captain opened the short service by introducing George Ormond, who took the bible class, and the pianist - possibly Charlie Graham - and T.R.S. Campbell ,the Chaplain. George Ormond would then conduct the service in his own inimitable way with his mop of silver-white hair giving the impression of a grand orator surveying his gathered masses. One of his other duties was Church Officer, giving great reverence as he carried in the bible up to the pulpit, then followed the Minister up the pulpit stairs and secured the latch on the door. However, back to the BB Bible Class which always ended with the singing of the last verse of the Company Hymn No.75 "Ye fair green hills of Galilee":

Jesus my Saviour, Master, King, Who didst for me the burden bear, While saints in heaven Thy glory sing, Let me on earth Thy likeness wear; Mine be the path Thy feet have trod, Duty, and love to man and God.

As the service ended, George had to hurry away through the connecting corridor to carry out his other duties in the Church, while we filed out the side door dropping a coin into the collection plate as we went. A memory that's stuck in my mind from those days was a Girls' Guildry plaque that hung above that side door and read - I think:

I will pass this way only once. Any good thing that I can do let me do it now as I may not pass this way again.

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

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

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# Guild News



The Happy Ukes got our session off to a foot-tapping start and the afternoon tea which followed gave everyone an opportunity to catch up after the summer break

Our first speaker was Peter Hay, coxswain of the Broughty Ferry lifeboat. His excellent illustrated talk gave us an insight into the work of the R.N.L.I. The story of one man's rescue when he got into extreme difficulties in the river was particularly moving. As a result of his life being saved, he, in time, became a volunteer member of the lifeboat crew.

We have been extremely fortunate to hear first-hand about two of the projects which the Church of Scotland Guild is supporting.

Firstly, Lynne and her husband told us about the work of Release International, the Voice of Persecuted Christians in Egypt which is home to the largest Christian minority in the Middle East. Christians face varying levels of discrimination and suffer poverty and lack of education. The money raised by Guild members throughout Scotland will help provide basic living needs, poverty will be alleviated and the impact of persecution will be reduced.

At our next meeting, Stephen gave us an insight into the work of CrossReach, the Social Care Council of the Church of Scotland. Unfortunately, their major projects are out with our area, but, in the Friary in Tullideph Road, Tayside Support Services, work with anyone over 16 in the Dundee area who is willing and committed to moving beyond drug use.

The two projects being supported by the Guild are the Sunflower Garden in Edinburgh and Daisy Chain in Glasgow. Stephen is willing to return at some point in the future to give us more information about these projects.

Going forward, our next speakers are Elliot Sawers, who will tell us about the work of Dundee Disabled Children's Association on 5<sup>th</sup> November and Sheila Kinninmonth, a storyteller from Fife, will be with us on 19<sup>th</sup> November.

In the book, the girl, Vashti, is upset in the art class because she says she can't draw. The teacher tells her to make a mark on the paper and then sign it. When Vashti then sees her dot, framed and on display in her teacher's office she's motivated to make an even better dot. Eventually, she grows in confidence and realises she is indeed a creative artist.

This was an excellent starting point to encourage our girls to gain confidence in their ability to tackle various activities. They made their own dots and developed them into a pattern.

We continued to meet during the school holidays when we enjoyed playing a wide-range of games including dominoes and tiddlywinks.

A Hallowe'en party rounded off the month of October. It proved to be great fun with an amazing selection of fancy dress, all the traditional activities like ducking for apples and doughnuts on string and lots of food.

Our numbers have continued to grow with nineteen girls attending. Although we are delighted to have welcomed so many new girls, we would love to see even more. Girls' Brigade is open to all girls of school-age. We meet on a Monday from 6,30pm to 8pm.

# October's Church Walk

Our last walk for 2024 was to Arbroath. We caught the 10:00 bus, arriving at our destination 40 minutes later on a lovely sunny day and headed out of the bus station to our first place of interest which was the Keptie Water Tower. This tower was built and completed in 1885 following a drought in the area in 1870. Over the next 30 years, the demand for water increased and eventually the tanks in the tower could not provide enough water, so in 1906, the Keptie Water Tower was closed as another water source had been found.

Close by is the Keptie Pond which we then walked round. There were children fishing for common carp and there were plenty of swans and ducks swimming in the water. Through her binoculars, Stella managed to spot 8 herons sitting up in the trees on the island in the middle of the pond. Before leaving the park, we headed up a hill for a photo of us all on an extremely large bench over 2m tall, called Jock's Bench, (back to our childhood!!!!) This was the first Big Bench in Britain and had been donated by the Keptie Friends.

We were now ready for a lovely lunch at the Bellrock Restaurant instead of our usual packed lunch, before heading along the sea front, stopping at the Lifeboat Shed for another photo then back to the Bus Station for the return journey.

A lovely walk with lots to see.

# Dr Graham's Homes, Kalimpong, India

Some of you may recognise the name of this school as it has been well supported by Church of Scotland Guilds over the years. Rev. Dr John Graham founded his "Homes" in 1900 in order to provide schooling for the children of tea plantation workers though, as you can imagine, it has moved with the times. (Kalimpong is not far, by Indian standards, from Darjeeling and the Himalayas can be seen from the school grounds).

A couple of years ago I started sponsoring a little girl so that she could attend the school and be accommodated in one of the cottages on the campus. Kristel is now twelve years old and by all accounts doing well in her various subjects; otherwise she might have found herself living on the streets. Last year I attended the annual London Reception for supporters of Dr Graham's and this year I went to the AGM in Edinburgh; gradually I have found myself being drawn in and, to cut a long story short, I'm about to become the Minutes Secretary for the UK Committee. This will be a way to become better informed about the school as well as about life in India, a country I have longed to visit for many years. I hope to be able to go over next September, as part of a group, after which I'd love to have an opportunity to tell you more about the Homes, first-hand.
