# Greetings from Anita





Prisoners Week - 19-25 November 2023

"Then the King will say to those on his right, 'Come, you who are blessed by my Father; take your inheritance, the kingdom prepared for you since the creation of the world. For I was hungry, and you gave me something to eat, I was thirsty and you gave me something to drink, I was a stranger and you invited me in, I needed clothes and you clothed me, I was sick and you looked after me, I was in prison and you came to visit me.' Matt 25:36

Last week I attended a meeting for all involved with ministry in St Matthew's in Perth.

I found myself seated beside a prison chaplain and during the morning I learned a lot about the challenges and blessings of prison chaplaincy. One of the biggest challenges is the lack of support for prisoners after their release, another is the lack of bereavement support in prisons. I explained that through JustBee in MSP our church provides somewhere to go, someone to talk to as well as practical support with food, access to social services and have recently started a 'Life after Loss' group.

A few days later I learned Claire, JustBee, has been invited to the launch service for Prisoners Week Scotland,19<sup>th</sup> -25th November in Letham St Marks Church in Perth.

That evening I received an email from the prison chaplain asking if he could come and visit us in Dundee! He is coming next week when we have the Life after Loss Group and I have been invited to the launch service for Prisoners Week, in Letham St Marks Church in Perth.

I believe the Holy Spirit is leading us to pray and provide practical support, through our mission partners JustBee for our brothers and sisters after their release from prison.

### **ADVENT TREE CHRISTMAS GIVING 2023**

This year our Advent Tree Christmas Giving will go towards providing practical support for men and women after their release from prison. In JustBee/MSP we provide, food, advice, a shower, and laundry facilities. The Laundry Project, which was launched in September, has highlighted another area of need. Often after their release from prison, people only have the clothes they are wearing. This year we hope to provide a 'change of clothes' for after release from prison. We are asking for donations to allow us to meet this need. A donation box will be available in the church from Advent Sunday until Christmas Eve. With each £10 raised we will place a card in one of the little Advent Stockings. It is our hope that by Christmas Eve we will have filled each stocking to allow us to provide clothes to meet this need.

We will also be buying selection boxes for our children and in JustBee for the Carol Service on Christmas Eve!



### Guild News



Our first speaker in October was Rosie Messeder from Signpost International which works out of the Roundhouse in Whitfield.

Signpost International recognises that poverty is a global phenomenon but also exists right here in Dundee. The Roundhouse is a place where the community can come together, learn more of the world they live in, eat good food, and support each other on the journey through life. Those attending learn how to be better stewards of what resources they have and are encouraged to chat and talk over any worries they might have.

The Kitchen and Café at the Roundhouse receives the surplus harvest produced by local farms, supermarkets and the produce from their own community garden. They then transform the surplus food destined for waste into freshly prepared, nutritious meals for distribution by foodbanks and larders across the city.

Signpost International is also currently working in Uganda and Kenya. In Uganda they train farmers in improved, sustainable farming methods and management of their natural resources. They have established school "gardens" for food production to provide pupils with lunch meals and improved farmers' access to key agricultural inputs such as drought-resistant seeds.

In Tunoyo, Kenya, they are working with a women-led community-based organisation on a pilot project with three income-generating enterprise groups for a total of 32 women. The women have been successful in producing vegetables in their community gardens, rearing improved chickens, and producing honey. These 32 women will then spread their knowledge to others in the community.

Unfortunately, our second speaker from the Deaf Hub had a puncture in Arbroath and was unable to get to our meeting. To fill the gap, we had a minibeetle drive which appeared to be greatly enjoyed judging by the laughter and chat throughout the afternoon.

Our next speaker is Dr Erin Farley whose topic is The Wellgate Project and on 21<sup>st</sup> November we welcome back Marjorie Gillan and her Armchair Aerobics.

# March of Time



This November issue of the Wyvern magazine will see the last contribution entitled 'March of Time'. It has been a feature for many years recounting the memories of life in the old St Andrews Kirk. It is now time to look forward in our new congregation of Kingsgait Kirk and create new stories.

2013 – The minister's letter mentioned this year was the 500<sup>th</sup> anniversary of the battle of Flodden where Scotland lost its King and so many of her government, bishops and men. She continued "Make November your Peace-building month. Build peace in your friendships, in your family, at church and at work and play.

2003 – In the course of conversation one Sunday one little girl was quite matter of fact about church attendance. She said: "I like going to church, Grandad, because when we come back to your house, we get a fried egg!"

1993 – Ailsa and Robin Hill wrote "In an average grocery basket you will find goods from all over the world". They continued by describing a sad story of exploitation of workers living in poverty by employers in developing lands. Low wages and poor condition in third world countries also help to keep our food prices low, but at what cost? They hoped that a small Traidcraft stall could be available on Sundays throughout November at the Church and if successful make it a regular feature.

1983 – Boys Brigade Officers, both past and present, attended the last service of Rev Routledge Bell in Caputh Church, Perthshire in recognition of his long association with the St Andrew's Company. Many BB laddie will remember the long march from summer camp to the Sunday morning service at the old Murthly Church.

1973 – The Girls' Brigade held a disco on 16<sup>th</sup> November with music provided by RocFloe disco band, tickets 25p. They went on to hold a Beetle-drive/Hostess Tea and sell Christmas cards for GB funds.

1963 – The Craftsman's Prayer was included ahead of Kirkin' o' the Trades Sunday. "O Christ, the Master Carpenter, Who, at the last, Through wood and nails, Purchased man's whole salvation, Wield well Thy tools in this Thy workshop That we who come rough-hewn May be fashioned To a truer beauty By the Hand. Amen

1953 – 72 year old Mr James Manson worked for Watson and Philip, food producers. He was married in our kirk by Harcourt Davidson and knew Preston Watson, the boss's son. Preston Watson was one of the early pioneers of flight and some argued he flew before the Wright Brothers at Kittywake, USA in December 1903. Mr Manson helped Preston Watson repair his first aeroplanes and in 1913 James built the third 'plane in the boiler shop of old Gourlay's foundry in Dock Street. As James was the lighter man, he often flew the experimental models at Errol.

1943 – The last Sunday of October saw the 'Kirkin' o' the Trades'. Rev T J Bunting welcomed office bearers and members of the Nine Incorporated Trades and Three United Trades.

1933 – The Woman's Guild winter session started on 3<sup>rd</sup> October with talks on 'How Scotland got the Bible' 'The Deaconess Hospital and 'The Church on Rural Scotland'.

1923 – Communion was taken by 1206 on Sunday 28<sup>th</sup> October and 43 new members were admitted the preceding Sunday.
