'A SAIR HEID'

Reflections on the Sunday School Picnic

My earliest memory of a Sunday School Picnic is of getting off the train and running. I do not know where we were or what happened later - just the sheer excitement of that moment. I do have another memory of crowds of people converging on the East Station, which was probably the same day. Therefore it is likely that the destination was Monifieth.

My sister says that she remembers the bus, going to the Den at Kirriemuir. This was an ideal spot with the hidden, enclosed nature of the park, with its grassy slope leading down to the small burn which ran through the middle of it, before the ground rose up steeply on the other side of the burn.

While that was the most frequent location, it was not the only place. One of the best picnics was when we should have gone to the Den but didn't. On a day of torrential rain, the bus took us past the Den to the top of Bellies Brae, where we alighted and ran straight into the nearby church hall. There we had indoor games, including relay races – running or hopping round or diving under the tubular metal framed chairs. It was great fun, although my mother said that the noise had been deafening.

We did go to other places too – Kirriemuir Common (very windy), Camperdown Park (a big tree) and Letham (a girl was taken to hospital after an accident on the chute).

Wherever the destination, there were certain constants – the excitement and the smell of grass. Then the men would bring round the big bakers' boards with paper bags with sandwiches and cakes for everyone, followed by huge kettles of tea for the adults and jugs of juice for the children. We all took our own cups – enamel mugs or soft plastic ones. Meanwhile the women would sit on rugs or coats, surrounded by all the paraphernalia needed for a picnic, providing a safe haven from which children could foray out on adventures and return at will.

After the refreshments, the men would hold the big ropes for the races without which no picnic was complete. There were running, three-legged, egg-and-spoon, wheelbarrow and sack race for all ages, toddlers to adults. Taking part, rather than winning was the aim.

The picnic was always a day to remember, but the main memory for my sister and me was the paper bags with sandwiches and cakes. You never knew what you would get – maybe a French Fancy or a fruit slice or even a "Sair Heid". This was a cake, not the kind of Sore Head that the adults probably had after the indoor picnic in the church hall. A Sair Heid, which was an individual cylindrical madeira cake, surrounded in greaseproof paper and topped with yellow icing. This delicacy can be obtained in some Bakers' shops in Dundee. If I eat one, I am instantly transported to the halcyon days of the Sunday School Picnic.

If luck should befall you a dolphin or two may appear in the river just within your view


A seat on a bench to study the Tay With the lapping of the waves to wash your troubles away
