Greetings from Anita

"And the Lord God planted a garden in Eden, in the east." Genesis 2: 8



Jyp and I have just returned from our walk in Baxter Park, in the east of the city. It is a beautiful morning, not yet nine o'clock, the winter sun is shining brightly, the frost and the dew vie for victory over the grass. Jyp, our golden retriever, has performed his regular check on the squirrel population of the park, they are all present and accounted for. A gentle giant he assumes the role of park custodian rather than predator as he carries out his duties.

There are definite signs of Spring, she has not yet sprung, but she is certainly poised for action. Astronomically speaking, the first day of spring is marked by the spring equinox, which falls on March 19, 20 or 21 every year. Meteorologically speaking, the official first day of spring is March 1, St David's Day. Whether we favour the equinox or the weather it is the wonder of the seasons which transports us on a morning like this.

Windows into lives, and as we stroll, I pray for them, their worries, joys, and futures.

At the top of the park the path we turn and walk into the sun, low in the sky. The Italian Renaissance style pavilion awaits us, now a registry office and best of all Blend café. Fortunately, it doesn't open until 10.00 and Jyp will have to resist running ahead of me to claim his seat by the window and puppuccino! As we come alongside the steps down to the green, we pause to give thanks for this wonderful space in our city, our shared garden, doggy walking friends, families, lunch time school children, staff, and visitors. I am reminded of the Lenten lilies in our church garden, of Lent, this season of preparation which almost seamlessly evolves into one of anticipation. Similar to the subtle changes in the daylight hours we experience an almost imperceptible change in our mood. I feel lighter, I find myself smiling, is this hope, excitement, exhilaration even?

Easter is coming and I don't want to rush it, I want to savour these moments of bright light, anticipation, expectation of salvation. I am not ready yet to fully experience Easter, but I am poised for the promise of another garden with a stone is rolled away, to hear Jesus say, 'Mary' and to cry out, 'Rabboni!'

Dana and Siobhan: Faith and Friendship

Who we are, where we are from and what we are doing.

Dana: Dana Alkhatib, Palestinian Jordanian, final year medical student. **Siobhan:** Siobhan Kerr, Irish, final year medical student (postgraduate- Medicinal Chemistry)

We arrived in Muheza, Tanzania on 5th of February for our six-week elective medical placement in remote and rural medicine. Our focus is on anaesthetics for Dana and paediatrics for Siobhan.

Our common interests.

Dana: Horses! Later books.

Siobhan: Horses. We planned this elective while on a ride. Books, love of travel and adventure.

Dana: Our love of faith has sparked some ridiculously interesting conversations, and the parallels between our people's histories are unfortunate but remarkable. I think it did bring us closer together.

Q. What does your faith mean to you?

Dana: It's the lens through which I perceive the world and, how I distinguish between right and wrong at every level, from brushing my teeth every morning, to choosing a career.

Siobhan: Everything. I cannot imagine living a second without my God, He is my all in all. Wherever or to whomever He sends me, I will go.

Q. How has your faith shaped your journey so far?

Dana: One of the biggest decisions I made was pursuing medicine over being a professional athlete. I thought to myself 'will I be able to sleep at night?' Something in me felt I had a duty to use the resources, abilities, and blessings Allah SWT gave me in service of my fellow man. There's a verse in the Quran that says that if any one person saves the life of one person you are rewarded as if you saved all mankind. To be given the tools to pursue a reward so great could only mean that this is what I was born for. Young as I was back then, I began my journey with a very quiet confidence; but that's the wonderful thing about faith – the only confidence you need is confidence in your Maker.

When I first arrived in the U K I was practically embryonic! Only 17, and completely on my own in a new country 3500 miles from home, where, for the first time, I was not a member of the majority group. The challenges ahead of me are too many to list, but I believed at the time what I still believe now. Life is a series of efforts. The journey we prepare for as people of religion is long. It extends beyond this life.

Having faith, Iman, is what gives me the fuel for that journey, and keeps me steadfast in the face of so much that I don't understand. It's a shield. Allah SWT kept the Iman in my heart that I needed to survive, Alhamdullilah. Ultimately, I know my job is simply to put in 110% effort. The outcome of my life is not my concern. All I want to do is to One Day stand in front of my Maker and say: "I tried my best".

Siobhan: At 17 I became a Christian and felt God's call to become a doctor. My A level Chemistry was a grade below the requirement for my offer to study Medicine in Bristol, but I knew God would get me there going His way. God's way included a degree in Medicinal Chemistry. I cannot express how thankful I am to Him to have come this way.

Not only did I regain confidence in my abilities and live in a wonderful community of Christians, but it also gave me the opportunity to spend time with my great uncle who later passed away. It also included working here, in Tanzania, in the year out before Medical School. God gave me experiences I would never have had anywhere else. Now, Dana and I are back here in the same hospital!

Once in Medical School, I loved every second! God has used my first degree in amazing ways- giving me opportunities I could never have imagined. I have a real joy and fire when I do what He created me to do. I rely on His grace to get me through.

Q. How has your friendship affected your understanding of the other person's faith?

Dana: My favourite thing I've learnt about Christianity is that there are far more similarities between our faiths than differences. I love when I quote the Quran and-**Siobhan:** I find a parallel verse from the Bible!

Dana: Sunlight shining through two windows, coming from the same source of light. In our tradition, the three Abrahamic religions are one in their purest form.

Siobhan: I love being able to share with each other along the journey.

Q. What are your plans going forward and how do you think your faith plays into that?

Dana: The last 5 years have been a journey of discovering not only the world but myself. Allah SWT has grown in my heart a love for all things critical care. I'm optimistic that Emergency Medicine is the way that I will best serve my people. Being separated from my family brings me endless sorrow, but to know that Allat SWT is rewarding me for my struggles, and that one day I'll be of use to the people I love most is what keeps me looking up and forward. When the war erupted back home, my mentor, who ironically, is an atheist, said to me "Dana, I can say with surety that the effort you are going through, in whatever small and distant way, is worth it." And he was right. There's a verse I love that says, "*Verily with hardship comes ease*". I love it because it means the peaks and troughs of life are not separate. However difficult a time I may be having, I'll also have something to enjoy and something to be grateful for. However painful being away from home may be, I have been blessed with wonderful friends and an incredible adventure to take on.

Siobhan: Wherever I will be, God will be with me. God surprised me with a passion for paediatrics, which throughout my studies has been affirmed again and again. Looking further ahead, a move into Clinical Genetics, God's created order from millions of years ago. It is an exciting, dynamic field with brand new technology and science but uniquely patient-centred. I too had a conversation with my mentor, also an atheist about the prospect of ethically navigating unchartered waters in this field. He said that in light of the compass of my faith, he had confidence that the speciality would be in a safe pair of hands.

Whether you are reviving a patient, pursuing a new cure, or holding their hand at the end of the road - you are God's advocate, representative, His hands and feet on this earth. It is a gift to be cherished.

Dana: In your heart there is something in you that helps you to stand at someone's side in their deepest and darkest moment. It is an honour and privilege.

TRANSFORM TRADE

Transform Trade, formerly known as Traidcraft Exchange, is working to reform the world's broken model of international trade which is currently full of exploitation, environmental damage and huge inequality. The vision is for trade to become equitable, sustainable and regenerative, so it benefits everybody. Transform Trade's work involves advocating for people-centred trade, as well as providing practical support for marginalised producers in the global south, many of whom were suppliers to Traidcraft.



£820 was also recently donated to Transform Trade from the sale of Fair Trade goods at Kingsgait Church over the years. Some of this was money which had been set aside for future purchases. The range of Fair Trade products on the stall is now quite limited, but favourites such as Cafedirect coffee and Divine chocolate remain, and guarantee a living wage and other benefits for producers. If coffee and cocoa beans can't provide a decent, sustainable income for farmers, they may disappear, and that would be very bad news for consumers. But we can use our consumer power for good, to keep producers in business, and be able to enjoy our favourite treats.




